# The Fun and Sun Reunion in Tucson by Lynn Cotterman

The 41st annual reunion of the 485th Bombgroup was held from September 28th to October 2, 2005 in the Sheraton Hotel in the beautiful city of Tucson, Arizona surrounded by two mountain ranges. The picturesque mountains can be viewed from anywhere in the city because the height of the buildings is restricted to four stories outside the downtown area.

The hotel was an indoor/outdoor facility because of the mild weather. The facilities were in separate buildings connected by covered walkways around the large pool area which was enclosed with a six foot high wrought iron fence. The hospitality building opened out into the fenced area so we were opening and closing the "clanging gates" quite often. A breakfast

buffet was included in the price of the room which was convenient and also made the cost of the room even more attractive.

To avoid overbooking, that happened last year, Michele, daughter of Leo Gagne, and I called most of the ones who attended the reunion last year to try to get a handle on the number planning to attend this year. We still had a larger crowd than we had anticipated, but we were able to work out accommodations.

I arrived Tuesday, but not many other veterans arrived early this year. I ran into Tony and Gert Siller and the Nardi's, Frank, Kitty and daughter, Barbara. Ted Dey, President of Air Force Reunions, intended to host the reunion, but cancelled because his father was seriously ill. He hired a former hostess, Kaye Hendricks, that had retired from the company, to fill in for him and she did a great job.

Several of the regular attendees who had reservations had to cancel for various reasons. Among them were our Chairman, Bob Benson and spouse, Dorothy, because Bob wasn't quite up to traveling yet; Col. Dan Sjodin was home with a cold and a temperature; Bob and Mildred Rector who live in Biloxi, greeted Mississippi were Hurricane Katrina. Their house was spared, but everything around it was devastated. Other regulars that cancelled were Jack and Irene Godfrey; Warren and Evelyn Gorman; Hank & Virginia Dolim. However, Lloyd Proudlove who has missed the last several reunions showed up with ten guests this year.

Wednesday, Bill Cummings, pilot from the 830th Squadron and an Air Force veteran pilot of 28 years volunteered to set up the bar and refreshments again this year with the help of his son, Philip, who is a Vietnam vet. (Philip said it was the other way around.) As usual they did a "bang up" job. Bill said his other son, David, who usually tends bar with them is recovering slowly from a stroke he suffered last year. We had an open bar again this year thanks to the generosity of the Estate of Ben Skelton, who was a pilot in the 829th Squadron. After the hospitality room was set up, I had lunch with some of the guys at Schlotzsky's, a New York Deli, located next to the hotel.

Wednesday evening the hugging and joyful cries could be heard coming from the Hospitality room as the vets and families arrived. Although we see many attractions each year in different cities that we visit nothing compares to the first evening of the reunion when friends get together again in the hospitality room.

Thursday our tour took us to the Pima Air & Space Museum and the adjacent "Bone Yard" where thousands of aircraft are stored. As we traveled down Kolb Ave. near the Museum we saw aircraft parked in the Bone Yard on both sides of the Ave. The museum has five large hangers filled with displays and air craft, including a B-24 and a B-17. On display outside are over 200 more aircraft. The inside of the B-24 seems smaller every time I see it. The museum enjoys an international reputation as one of the best anywhere. The time spent there passed quickly.

Thursday evening we enjoyed a buffet dinner at the hotel followed by one of the best entertainers of the reunion; teenage Mariachi players. They received a standing ovation. Friday we boarded the tour bus and traveled to the hills west of the city to Old Tucson, "Hollywood in the Desert". I was impressed by the size of the movie set. There are 40 complete buildings, not just the fronts facing the street. The program included a shoot out performed by stuntmen and lunch at Big Jake's.

It was early afternoon when we returned to the hotel. I joined Frank Nardi's family and we drove to an upscale shopping mall in the northern part of the city. Kitty and Barbara were casing the clothing stores and I could tell they were planning to return the next day. We had dinner at one of the several restaurants in the center. It was Friday night so things were jumping.

Saturday, The Group meeting was held in the morning with Bob Hanson, Sr., Deputy Chairman, presiding. Bob is getting to be a pro at conducting the meetings and they move right along like clockwork. The squadron meetings followed.

When I entered the hospitality room in the afternoon I noticed a group around a pretty young lady. It was Pop Arnold's daughter, Kathleen. She had brought Pop's picture album and was explaining the photos to the guys. Kathleen lives with her husband of 22 years and their daughter in a suburb of Denver, Colorado. Before she was married, Kathleen had a career as a Congressional Investigator with the U.S. General Accounting Office and rose to Supervisory Audit Manager in the Denver Regional Office. She is a delightful and interesting person and everyone enjoyed

visiting with her. She is very sociable and I don't think she has ever met a stranger. Pop and Katherine raised a winner.

In another part of the hospitality room was a wine tasting group. Jerry Whiting's Partisan friend from Yugoslavia has a vineyard and sent Jerry a bottle of spirits for the veterans at the reunion. Jerry said he wanted someone to try it first to see if it was safe to drink. Everyone who sampled it had the same reaction, "WOW!". It burned all the way down, like Kentucky moonshine. The guys who were downed in Yugoslavia said they had the same reaction when drinking the local beverage there. It was a nice friendly gesture on the part of the Partisans.

Interestingly enough, the Partisan who sent the spirits is the one who rescued Richard Boehme when Boehme and his crew ditched off the coast of Croatia in October 1944. The partisan and his cousin swam out into the bay and cut Boehme free of his shroud lines and brought him to shore while being shot at from across the bay. Tito's partisans as well as the Chetniks helped many American flyers avoid the Germans and to return to Venosa. Saturday evening after the photo session we entered the banquet room. I met Lt General Mark Schmidt and his lovely wife, Lisa. They are a very gracious couple and seemed to enjoy meeting the veterans and their families. General Schmidt seemed young to me to be a three star General, but let's face it, anyone that is 25-30 years younger than we are is young.

Jerry Whiting was in charge of the medal presentation program and did a commendable job. Dinner and dancing followed, but many ladies

were disappointed that the proficient dancer, Colonel Dan, was missing. The evening wound down and an enjoyable day came to a close.

Sunday morning The Memorial program followed the breakfast. Sherrill Burba who usually is charge of the program was not able to attend the reunion because of illness in the family. Al Martin filled his shoes as we honored the veterans who made the ultimate sacrifice and the veterans who have passed away since. "Some gave much, others gave all".

Some of us relaxed and stayed over until Monday. I had dinner Sunday evening with Glenn and D.D. Hess, Jerry and Ann Whiting, and Bill and June Ryan at a Mexican Restaurant, "Las Margarita". Then I joined the Nardi's for a nightcap and we closed the reunion book for another year. Next Fall we are planning another great time at the reunion in Columbia, South Carolina. See you there!

# Jerry Whiting appointed 485th Historian

Jerry is the son of the late Wayne Whiting who was the tail gunner on Bob Baker's crew in the 831st Squadron. Jerry has a Bachelor of Arts degree from the university of California and a Master's degree. He worked in law enforcement in the San Francisco bay area for 28 years in various assignments before retiring. Also he worked with several European police departments. He became interested in his father's military career and the 485th Bombgroup when he read 200 letters that Wayne had written to his mother (Jerry's grandmother) while in Italy. After a couple years of research Jerry, with his father, published a book titled, "I'm Off To War Mother, But I'll Be Back". He had a quite a number of research papers about the 485th that he had compiled when writing the book. He started working with Sammy answering inquiries. Jerry also worked with me in compiling over 3000 names of 485th veterans that served in Italy and entering them on a spreadsheet with some information about each. Jerry noted that there were many MIA's (Missing in action) on spreadsheet and he wondered what continued next page

had happened to the crews after they bailed out on a mission. After two more years of research that included visiting crash sites in Poland and talking with witnesses, he published a second book titled, "Don't Let The Blue Star Turn To Gold". Because of his efforts there are very few MIA's from the 485th that are unaccounted for. He currently keeps in touch with historians in several countries.

The 485th Committee had no problem voting unanimously in favor of his appointment.


Bob Hanson led the Group in the Pledge of Allegiance.




Arnold. Kathleen Arnold, "Pop" Arnold's daughter was in attendance at the reunion.



The 485th BG was honored this year when Lt. General Mark Schmidt, his wife Lisa, and some of his staff joined us at our reunion banquet. General Schmidt, current commander of the 12th Air Force, had a special mission, the presentation of a medal to the family of an 831st Squadron airman killed 61 years ago.

The story began several years ago, when Polish President Lech Wallensa authorized the presentation of the Polish War Cross to Captain William Lawrence's 8315t Sqdn. crew. (As mentioned in a previous LWT article, six of the crew were killed and five survived.)

The survivors were presented the medals. A few of the families of the deceased were located, but several of the families were not found, despite efforts by the Air Force. One such family was the family of Lewis Kaplan.

In 2005, Burl Jackson, a friend of Kaplan's and a member of Kaplan's original crew, sent Jerry Whiting a letter he received in 1944 from Kaplan's sister, Rebecca Uslan. Whiting located Rebecca and her daughter, Leslie. The Uslans soon made plans to join us at the 485th reunion, to honor Lewis Kaplan. Ultimately, ten of Kaplan's family attended.

We felt the banquet would be a perfect time to present the medal. We contacted Maxwell AFB, requesting the presence of Dan Mortensen, Air Force historian, to assist with the presentation. (Dan originally found several of the crew – Lt. Commander Lisa Walker, U.S. Navy (daughter of Billy Walker, 828th Squadron), assisted by writing a letter to the USAF Chief of Staff.

Dan Mortensen attended, spending time with Kaplan's family but had to leave before the medal ceremony. The Chief of Staff selected Lt. General Schmidt to present the medal, a wonderful choice. studios and many films were made there in the 40's and 50's starring Gene Autrey, Jimmy Stewart, Burt Lancaster, Kirk Douglas, Glenn Ford and Ronald Reagan.



#### A Journey Begins

I would like to tell you about a journey's beginning, which began over 3 years ago when I received a phone call from a journalist named Starr Smith. He was writing about Jimmy Stewart's experience as a Bomber Pilot in WWII and was hoping to interview my Dad, but he had to settle for me, since Pop was now gone. Many of you know that Jimmy Pop was Stewart's Commander at the 29th Bombgroup in Boise, and he played a pivotal role in getting Jimmy a combat assignment in England. Over the years, I have written down my Dad's Jimmy Stewart stories, and Starr and I talked extensively about Pop and Jimmy's relationship and about Pop's military career in general. He suggested that I write my own family book about my Dad. The seed was planted, I thought, why not? To do so meant I would have to do something that I wasn't that comfortable with; invade my Dad's personal records. I finally worked up the courage and hauled home a mountain of files, papers, photographs, books, etc. and prepared a attack. That experience opened up a whole new world and purpose for me and began my Journey to Tucson.

As I began to chronicle over 70 years of my Dad's life, one letter written in November 2001 by a Polish man grabbed my attention first. I had no idea whether my Dad

had ever responded to that letter before he passed away. Little did I know then, that two years later I would meet the author of that letter Tucson, Arizona; Szymon Serwatka. In Szymon's letter, he referenced two men and my Dad and had circled the names of these men in red pen. Those names were Sammy Schneider and Warren Sortor and although the names rang a bell, I was curious to know more about them. So, I picked up my Dad's copy of This Is How It Was, and read every word from cover to cover for the first time. I was totally fascinated and over the next year, I immersed myself into the history and personnel of the 485th Bombgroup. Becoming a WWII nut in the process, I researched, referenced, cross-referenced and indexed historical information to my documents and I read many books and personal accounts of Allied Airmen, POWs in Europe beginning with. By God We Made It! by Vernon O. Christensen. Eventually, the names I'd read about and the pictures I'd seen became so familiar to me. I could recognize faces, relate to their experiences, and feel for them. Finally, after making my way through my Dad's files and data, I called Sammy Schneider. That phone call was an inspirational turning point for me and after Sammy and I talked, I had a new mission.

I was compelled to meet the heroic men of the 485th whom I had gotten to on paper and from whom I'd heard my Dad proudly talk about for many years. My first trip was to meet Sammy who lived only a few miles from me and that was a glorious day! For two people who had never met, there was an instant bond and comfortable familiarity

between us. He convinced me more than ever that I must meet the rest of the Group. By this time however, 👣 the 2004 reunion in Alexandria had already taken place, but when I read in the Lightweight Tower that the next reunion would be in Tucson, I was intrigued. Not only did Pop graduate from the University of Arizona at Tucson in 1936 his first Command assignment was the 39th Bombgroup at Davis-Monthan Field in 1942, age of 28. Believing in the powers of fate, I felt Pop was sending me a divine message that this is the reunion I needed to go to. I then called Warren Sortomme, the other name my Dad had circled in red in Szymon's letter. Talking to Warren was especially exciting for me because he was shot down with my Dad and the only direct connection to that event that I knew of. Confirming that Warren was going to be at the reunion, there was no longer any doubt in my mind. I was going to Tucson.

My mother had been a valuable, supportive resource for me throughout my mission to document my Dad's life and she told me my trip to Tucson would be "thrilling." But my experience in Tucson was so profound, a once in a lifetime experience, that went well beyond thrilling. Initially, primary reason for going was to meet the veterans of the Group, however, never did I expect the overwhelming flood of emotions, the heartfelt outpouring of love and the esteemed welcome that I received from every single person there. Not only was it a dream come true to finally look into the twinkling eyes of the men I'd gotten to know so well in my imagination, but to also meet their warm, wonderful and generous families



was an unexpected bonus gift. I wish to express my deepest gratitude to all of you who shared your life and stories with me, and making my journey rewarding and full-filling. You have helped me know my Dad as much more than just a father, but as a man, a leader, a friend. I'm so proud to have had the opportunity to represent my Dad and let all of you know how important you were to him during his life. I'm especially honored to join the elite group of sons, daughters, brothers, sisters, mothers and wives, for whom you've answered lifelong questions, solved old mysteries, brought comfort and closure to, and shared a few "lies" and laughs with. For that I salute all of you, and I know Pop would too.

For me, it's a wonderful beginning of cherished new friendships and relationships to come. I am so sorry I didn't get to talk to everyone who was there because I know that every single person, no matter what generation, has a valuable story to share and I can't wait to hear it! I won't say goodbye, but instead, see you later.

My journey continues.

#### Notes from the Historian

It has been a busy year, starting with the efforts to finish my book. Sammy Schneider contacted me several months ago, asking if I would consider taking over as the historian. I agreed, but only if he would stay involved and help me, so here I am.

An important part of this position is providing people with information when requests are made. A very important part of the historian's assignment will continue to be to provide timely responses to these requests. I rely on the Squadron Reporters to provide me with answers I don't have and will also contact others in the group. Some requests relate to specific missions; others are about individuals in the group specific aircraft information. All inquiries and requests will be answered.

One request was concerning the December 17, 1944 mission to Blechhammer. John Bybee, a writer, is writing a book and needed answers. The mission report reveals "rockets fired from the ground were observed" over Hungary and Bybee is looking for an eyewitness. I contacted Colonel John Atkinson, who led the mission, and he has no memory of this. I've contacted a couple of others, but found no eyewitnesses. If any of you have info, let me know.

We're also looking for other information to include with the 485th history. Lynn Cotterman and I are collecting information about "Lone Wolf" missions flown by the 485th. I discussed this with Colonel Herblin at the Washington D.C. reunion. Colonel Herblin flew some of these single plane raids flown

only at night or in bad weather. It appeared these missions were discontinued, due to high losses at the end of 1944, until Lisa Walker supplied us with the diary of her father, Billie Walker (828th Squadron, Lt. William Brien's crew). The diary shows he flew two "Lone Wolf" raids, on February 17, 1945 to Zagreb and April 12,1945 to Munich and was wounded on the last one. There is no record of either mission in the official records. If any of you can shed light on this, particularly on 1945 missions, please contact Lynn or me.

I've heard rumors of sabotage in the 485th, but found no substantiation. What I had heard was that someone put explosives in the wheel wells of B-24's, causing planes to blow up after take-off. I know rumors abounded, but if you have any information that would substantiate this (or prove it false), it would be very helpful.

I continue to accumulate info about the 485th. This includes copies of diaries, navigators logs and unpublished stories. I plan to provide copies of these to Maxwell AFB, where the 485th records are housed. Meanwhile, these items are extremely valuable for research. If you have copies of these (or other items) that you'd like to share, I'm happy to receive these things.

Meanwhile, we'll keep searching for answers for those who inquire. If you have any research questions, feel free to contact me.

We are excited about a new 485th website that is under construction. It will contain the group history, missions, stories, photos, reunion



# **Continuing Searches For Planes and Crews**

Last year we included an article about B-24's recently found in Europe, with the promise of an update if any 485th B-24's were located. Since then, crash sites of three 485th B-24's have been located.

On March 2, 1945 there was a midair crash over Austria of two 828th B.S. planes enroute to Linz, Austria. These planes (42-52064) and (42-52644) were piloted by Earl Pooley and Carl Langley. Both planes were recently found near Walchesee, Austria. Austrian researcher Jakob Mayer was instrumental in locating the sites. On Sept. 10, 2005 a ceremony was held at the site, with local officials and nearby residents attending. Also in attendance was Don Magness, brother of John Magness (deceased) from Pooley's crew.

In early April of this year, I was asked to assist in identifying a B-24 that had just been found in the Adriatic, not far from Zara. Croatian divers made a positive identification by the tail number on the plane. The plane was an 829th B.S plane, flown by Richard Boehme, lost on the October 16, 1944 mission to Graz, Austria. A complete story of this plane and crew is included in my new book <u>Don't Let the Blue Star Turn Gold</u>. Bill Culver, top turret gunner who was flying with Boehme's crew, was contacted and put in touch with those who found the plane. Culver has contacted the Partisan woman who rescued him and was recently sent a piece of the aircraft. Judy Birdsong, daughter of the bombardier, Richard Weintritt (deceased), was also contacted.

Dr. Jakob Mayer is currently searching for an 828th Bomb Squadron plane, piloted by Robert Ware and Bill Ryan, shot down near Bruck on February 23, 1945. When I recently contacted him, he had leads and felt he would soon find the wreckage.


A chance phone conversation with another 485th Vet led to the identification of the crash site of an 831st B.S. plane, piloted by Jerome Warner. This plane went down on the November 20, 1944 mission to Blechhammer. The Vet, top turret gunner Frank Hennessey said the plane was shot down near Zilina,



Czechoslovakia. I recalled that Slovakian research Peter Kassak made an inquiry about this crew a couple of years ago. I gave the info to Kassak, who immediately identified the site from old records. The site is now under water, due to a dam project.

When requests are made for information, we're aware that the remains of some airmen are still missing and this is considered when providing information. For instance, in Bulgaria, Professor Stan Stanev, who teaches at Shumen University, believes he has located the crash site of John Crouchley's plane. Crouchley, an 828th Bomb Squadron pilot, was shot down in Bulgaria on June 28, 1944 returning from a mission to Bucharest. Crouchley stayed with the plane, allowing the crew to get out, but died in the crash. Local records show he was buried near the crash site, but his remains were never returned. Stanev is researching this in Bulgaria. I recently met with Dan Crouchley, nephew of John Crouchley. We're hoping to solve this mystery for the Crouchley family, with the assistance of our Bulgarian friends.


Lastly, there's the case of Lt. Arthur Lindell. Lindell and his 828th B.S. crew were lost over Blechhammer on December 26, 1944. The copilot that day was Avery Gilliland, who replaced the regular copilot, Duke Wareham. Local records show all nine crewmen were buried locally, yet their remains were never recovered, identified and returned. Barry Wareham, son of Duke Wareham, has taken a real interest in this. He located Bessie Lindell Hannahs, sister of Art Lindell. She and some of the family met with some of us at the Tucson reunion, including Bill Williams (828th gunner from Gilliland's crew.), Barry Wareham, Tony Kujawa (nephew of gunner Joseph Lajkowicz, who was on the plane) and Szymon Scrwatka. We decided to form an informal committee to try to find answers. Szymon Serwatka and his group are looking for records and answers in Poland. On this side of the ocean? Bill Williams, Barry Wareham, Lisa Walker (daughter of Billy Walker, 828th Squadron), Tony Kujawa, Lynn Cotterman and I are looking for records that might help. Any significant finds will be turned over to our government.

# A look at a specific year from the past, recalling the people, places and events that made the news. This issue, we turn back the clock to...

The Year in Review: World War II remains the topic on everyone's mind as the United States and the rest of the Allies fight to defeat the Axis powers.

On June 4, Rome falls to the Allies. Two days later—D-Day—the Allies begin "Operation OVER-LORD", the invasion of Western Europe with a massive movement of manpower and materiel into France through a beachhead on the Normandy coast. D-Day is a costly success and a turning point in the war.

The invasion had been requested for years by Russian leader Joseph Stalin, whose country has been relentlessly attacked by the Germans. The invasion of France forces Germany to fight a war on two fronts, splitting its forces.

Later in the summer, German leader Adolf Hitler survives an assas-

sination attempt and the Allies invade southern France. In Asia, the Allies begin attacking Japan with B-29 Superfortress bombers and the fight to win the Pacific theater continues.

In October, nearly 700 Allied warships and transports mass to invade Leyte, in the Philippines. Gen. Douglas MacArthur, commander of Allied forces in the Southwest Pacific, walks through the surf onto the beach, making good on his promise, "I shall return." He had been ordered to flee the Philippines after prolonged battles with the Japanese in 1942.

As the year draws to a close, a German counterattack in the Ardennes causes a dent in the Allies' lines. Surrounded and outnumbered, American forces at Bastogne hold out. Moving quickly, the U.S. 1st and 9th armies attack from the north and the 3rd army attacks from the south to push the enemy back in a costly campaign known as the Battle of the Bulge.

Back in England, unmanned German V-2 rockets rain terror on London. They are the first medium-range ballistic missiles.

In the United States, while almost 7,000 people are enjoying a performance of the Ringling Brothers Circus in Hartford, Connecticut, a fire erupts, incinerating the main tent in 6 minutes. Hundreds are injured and 168 people die, making this the worst circus disaster in history.

On the Home Front: People support the troops by participating in paper and metal drives that supply nearly half the steel, tin and paper needed for the war effort.

Pasta sales slide due to shortages of cheese and tomato sauce, while Jell-O becomes a substitute for canned fruit being sent to the front lines. Because so many women (roughly 3.5 million) are working alongside 6 million men on assembly lines, home baking declines and baking powder sales fall.

Neighborhood grocery stores proliferate, instead of supermarkets, because of gas rationing that prevents longer shopping trips.

popularity after moving from Yank and Stars and Stripes into the domestic press.


