

MISSION NO 12: VAIL, COLORADO - Bob Deeds

Our westward journey started at Toledo, Ohio Wednesday morning with Howard and Marguerite Woodyard. Woody aimed the ol' iron horse down highway 80 and with a resounding
"Colorado Or Bust!", we were off with a roaring start. Well, it was almost a bust for
the ol' iron horse eventually got its temperature up, forcing us to make our first over
night stop a few hours ahead of schedule. First Aid was render to the iron horse, replacing its water pump. Thursday, we crossed the plains states, reining in at Fort
Morgan, Colorado where we spent the night safely from the dangers of the wild and wooly
west. At Denver Airport, Friday morning, we met several ol' eagles who rented cars and
took in the sights of Denver before going on to Vail.

On the road to Vail we came upon what we thought was an ol 49er hiking which turned out to be Vic Bone. Vic hopped aboard and we continued to make tracks along the winding road slowly because of the road repairs under way which allowed us to enjoy more so, the beautiful mountain scenery. Well, the ol iron horse blew its top as we reined in at the Talisman Lodge busting a radiator hose and belching a huge cloud of steam. About now I believe the iron horse skinner Woody, is ready to exchange it for a covered wagon and a team of mules.

The ol eagles were gathering and Rod Ritchie had activities in progress in the Columbine room. Marguerite and Dorothy pitched in, taking care of registrations. In short order the pace was set and before this ol eagle retired Friday melted into Saturday.

With the oil refineries in Ploesti, Roumania severely damaged, the refineries in Austria and Germany assumed a greater importance, where production was increased. As part of the strategic effort of the 15th Air Force against oil targets, 147 Liberators of the 55th Bomb Wing were dispatched on 26 June 1944 to attack the Florisdorf Oil Refinery and Marshalling Yards outside Vienna, Austria. For outstanding performance in carrying out the mission, the 485th Bomb Group was awarded the Unit Citation.

At 0535 hours, under a clear sky, the first of 38 Liberators of the 485th begin rolling down the runway on its first mission to Florisdorf Oil Refinery. Captain Daniel

D Sjodin, 831st CO, led the first attack unit and Captain John C Sandall, 829th Flight Leader, led the second attack unit. P-38's of the 306th Fighter Wing provided fighter cover, joining the formation at 0825 hours. Mechanical problems caused four Liberators to return early. As the formation passed over Lake Balaton, 830 Lib BOOZER (42-52702H, White A), piloted by Lt Jacob S Disston III, was



observed emitting smoke from number 4 engine. At 0910 hours It Disston left the formation and was last observed with four unidentified silver-colored fighters following his Liberator. It was later learned that the Liberator crashed in Yugoslavia after the crew abandoned the bomber. Nine of the crew parachuted safely and one reported missing.

Approaching the IP (Initial Point), Ganserndorf, Austria, the Group was attacked by 35 to 40 enemy aircraft consisting of Ju88's, Me 110's, Me 210's, Me 109's and FW 190's. Flying low and level with the formation, they came in from 12 o'clock, firing incendiary rockets, cannon and machine guns. Passing through the formation, they continued to attack from 6 o'clock as the bombers made their bomb run, encountering intense, accurate, heavy flak. At 0945 hours the Group dropped 60 tons of incendiaries, saturating the target area. Rallying off the target southward, 828th Liberator SICK CALL (Red T, 41-29491H), piloted by Lt Parke Bossart, Crew 10, received a direct hit by flak and went down. SSgt Stanley Turecki, Radio Operator/Gunner of Crew 10 continues the story.

"As we approached the target we could see that it was covered with a blanket of black smoke. Just as we anticipated, the Germans were greeting us with a heavy flak barrage. Shortly after 'Bombs Away' our Lib was hit by flak. I looked out the waist window and saw the wing and engines on fire. Unable to contact Lt Bossart on the intercom, I attempted to go forward to the flight deck. However, there was a fire in the bomb-bay, preventing me from reaching the flight deck so I returned to my station.

"Our ball turret gunner, Cpl Maurice Brown, was hit in the leg. TSgt Eino Nikkila, flight engineer/gunner and I helped Brown from the turret, attached his chute and bailed him out through the rear entrance door. In all the excitement I didn't realize that I had removed my gloves and found that I couldn't attach my chute as my hands were very cold. Desperately, I finally managed to attach the chute to my harness. (How we used to abuse these life savers - kicking them, sitting on them and throwing them around the waist section. It's a wonder they opened when we pulled the rip-cord.) I signaled Eino to jump next. But he appeared to freeze at this point. Now all kinds of thoughts began running through my mind, like the plane exploding from the fires. But the Good Lord was with me and I believe He pushed me out the hatch. Remember, one was supposed to count to ten before pulling the rip-cord. Well, my count was - 1, 2, 10, PULL

"After a successful landing I took count of my situation and started walking away. Feeling a sharp pain in my right leg, I rubbed the spot and noticed blood on my hand. This was my first realization of being hit by flak - two pieces in my leg and one in the thigh. My freedom was short lived for about an hour later, I was captured by two armed soldiers.

"At this point, the events were a bit hazy. Arriving at a nearby hospital, I met our bombardier, Lt Elmer Ellis, also wounded by flak. Doctors dressed our wounds with a salve and paper bandages. Then on to the jail-house, where two of our crew greeted us, SSgt Roy Reiten, turret gunner and Sgt Nikkila. Eino stated he bailed out as soon as I 'hit the silk'.

"We spent a few days here and then we were transported by truck under heavy guard, to a railroad siding and loaded into a very small box-car. There were so many of us packed in, that we all had to stand. After an eternity, with a dozen stops, we arrived at our POW camp, KGF LGR 4D LW. Here was our home - starting a new life as number 2759. A

point of interest- our diet consisted of potatoes, potato soup, a turnip called calaroby, and bread which looked like it was made from saw dust. We received Red Cross parcels once a week which we divided amongst the four of us. I lost 32 pounds as a POW.

"Sometime during February 1945, we evacuated the camp which now had a population of 4,000 men of which 1,000 were British airmen, some having been POW's for two and three years. The reason for the evacuation was the big Russian offensive. We walked and walked through snow and cold weather - in wet shoes. About seventy-five per cent of the men had colds, half had diarrhea. Many died along the way. This, by the way, was called the 'Black March'.

"Eventually we crossed the Elbe River. Then the Yanks or British started an offensive. It was back across the Elbe again. The Germans held on to us, apparently hoping to use us as a bargaining tool when it came time to discuss peace. Finally sometime during the early part of May we were liberated by the British. We were flown to a camp in Brussels where we were deloused, clothed and fed. Seven days later on to Camp Luck Strike in France. Five weeks later we departed for the good Ole USA by ship."

There were additional combat casualties. Eight Libs received major damage and 14 minor damage from flak and enemy fighters. Three crew members were wounded. yellow T of the 829th, piloted by Lt Clark Miller, was severely damaged and landed on the Isle of Vis where it remained for major repairs. Gunners claimed 12 enemy aircraft destroyed. 2 probable destroyed and 2 damaged. It all came to an end at 1255 hours as the Libs began to land at home base.




