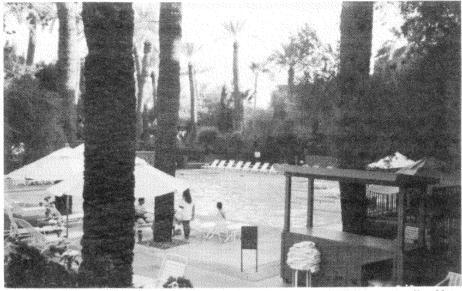
Other class entertainment acts are being arranged; June's cooking up a special ladies luncheon to be included in the program.

485th Veteran Wins Election

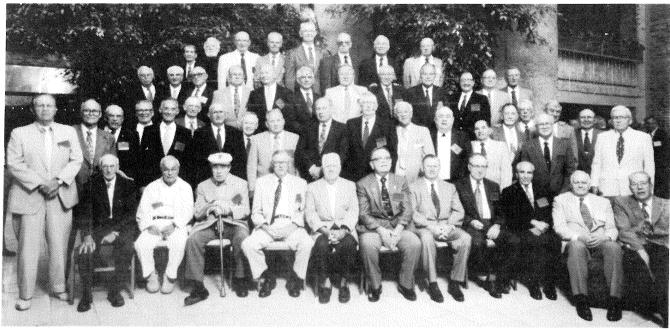
A 485th Group veteran was one of the major players in a North Carolina political upset which was historical in nature last November.

Jesse Ledbetter, a veteran of the 831st squadron, was one of two Republicans which unseated incumbent Democrats in North Carolina's 28th Senate district.

Because of the Republican sweep in the state, the GOP took control of the state House of Representatives for the first time since 1894. Republicans have at least 24 of the 50 Senate seats, which virtually gives the GOP control because of conservative Democratic senators.

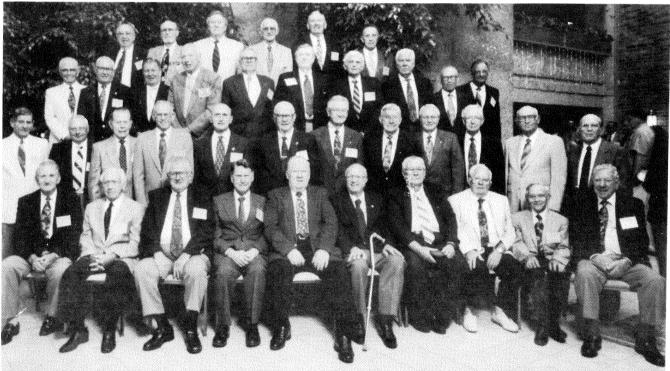
Ledbetter, a resident of Asheville, received 43,085 votes in the District 28 balloting, which was the second highest total for any State Senatorial candidate in North Carolina.

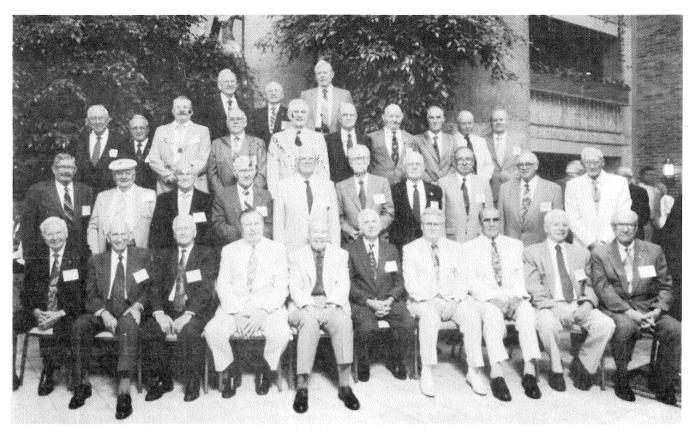

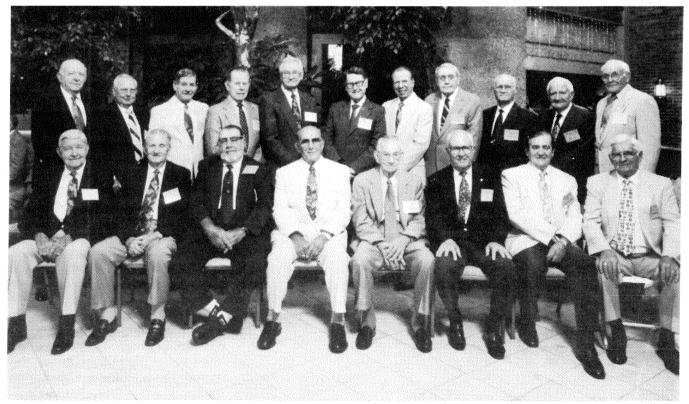

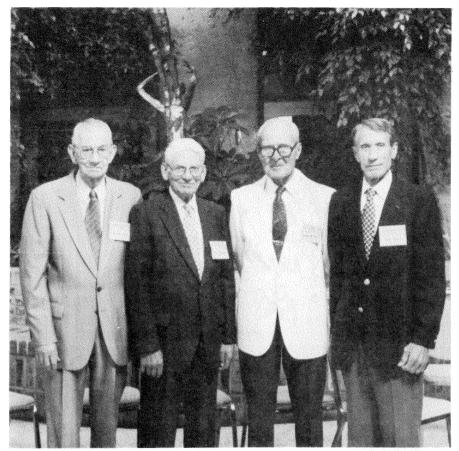

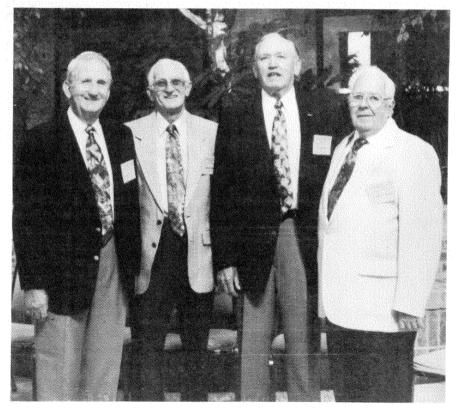

Facts, Non-Fiction and Comedy

Since receiving the assignment for compiling our Bomb Group's history, a few letters of interest have been received.

In particular the following story by Clarence "Deacon" Miller, nose gunner who flew with the original crew in the aircraft "Life."

I think you will find interest in his "Facts, Non-Fiction and Comedy."

So This Is How It Was -

By "Deacon" Miller

FACTS — In the month of July '44, the 15th AAF lost more men than all the Allied Forces fighting in Italy. 315 Aircraft Shot Down (B-17 and B-24) with 3,150 aircrew members lost ref. Great American Fighter Pilots of WWII, page 179.

15th AAF first year of operation (Nov. '43 to Nov. '44) losses as given in an interview by Gen. Ira Eaker to the Associated Press on 26 March '45 was 2,057 Heavy Bombers, (B-17 and B-24), with a loss of 20,570 men. The article appeared in the Picayune (New Orleans newspaper). I have a copy of the article.

NON FICTION — My wife Ruth lived in Frankfurt, Germany during the war. Her family still lives in Germany and we plan to visit them next year. Some of her cousins were officers and others were regular personnel like you and I. Every one of the families lost one in the service.

The first time we visited Germany (1965), her one cousin (who worked himself up from an enlisted man was made an officer in the field) asked me how could I volunteer to fight against a country where my ancestors originated from.

I still remember to this day what I told him. "I fought for what I thought was right just as he had also done." That broke the ice and all the relatives accepted me as one of the family.

I had the good fortune of visiting the Esso refinery in Karlsruhe, with Ruth's brother and my father-in-law. I had a very nice chat with the engineer responsible for the operation of the refinery. He showed us around and we chewed the fat and exchanged

experiences and dates. He was located at the refinery outside of Wien (Vienna).

As soon as the bombing raid was over, Berlin had personnel fly in and they would go to the surrounding communities and conscript the populace. Within 24 hours they had the damage repaired enough that production could begin again. I found this interesting.

I also had a talk with a fellow who was 15 during the war when he was drafted and was a radar operator at Stuttgart, at an anti-aircraft gun emplacement. When I see him I avoid politics.

Our tail gunner, Stuart Gansell, and I visited the huge material dump at Djedeida, Tunisia to get a carburetor for his British BSA motorcycle. He traded his portable radio for the cycle from the mess sgt. at Oudna.

This dump was so large, it was like a huge town. Prisoners under British control took you around this huge dump where the motorcycles were located. All types and nationality were located.

After Stu got his Carb., we then walked around and came to the aircraft section. There we examined ME-109's and JU-88's, sat in their cockpits and tried to envision what it must be like to fly in them. To make a long story short, we were by ourselves as the prisoner left us back dug the explosive out. by the cycles.

COMEDY

We were trying to find our way to the gate and while doing so, we walked through tall grass almost hip high when I fell over a box. Looking down, I saw a case of grenades. I took one and stuck it in my shirt and was. It turned out to be British.

In the tent, I started to take it apart. "Deacon, you are going to kill us was a plug which I removed. Holding the parts. Finding them, I cleaned the handle, I removed the pin. While looking through the bottom, I could see a plunger, so I gingerly lifted lightly on the handle and I could see

the plunger move up and down. Therefore, I concluded something was missing.

I was sitting on my cot at the time. Now holding it upright and teasing the crew, I happened accidentally (it was not intentional, honest) lifted the handle too far when down went the plunger and hit the end of the cot with a loud "bang." Everyone dove out of the tent into the mud, as it had been raining quite hard by now.

When they saw nothing happened, they came back into the tent, all covered with mud, wet and mad. Our engineer, Dewey, went to Jones, our pilot, and told him: "Deacon has a grenade and sure as hell will kill us."

Jones came to our tent and told me to get rid of the grenade. I told him I wanted it as a souvenir. I was told to get rid of it. Since it was storming, I asked if it was ok, if I did it tomorrow. He gave his ok.

The next day it's still raining cats and dogs. "Deacon you must get rid of that grenade," I was told. Putting on my rain gear and sticking the grenade in my pocket, I walked out to our aircraft. At our ship, I looked in the tool box for a screw driver, because I wanted to remove a plug which was located on the side of the grenade. Finding one, I unscrewed the plug and found a solid yellow explosive inside the shell. Carefully, I

Having removed the contents the best I could, I then opened the draincock and filled the cavity with gasoline, swished it around to remove any left over explosive. Putting the grenade together, I pulled the pin and threw it about 30" away.

The handle went one way (oh, I brought it back to my tent. I at the had left the Plug out of the bottom), time did not know what nationality it the plunger went in another direction and the body of the grenade still in another. Together they all fell in the mud. Waiting about a minute, noall!!" At the bottom of the grenade thing happened, I went hunting for them all up. I knew the grenade was harmless.

Clarence "Deacon" Miller forwarded me the following information: The Caterpillar Club will admit any person who has saved his or her life in an emergency with a parachute of Irvin design regardless of the company, in any part of the world, which manufactured it. This is the only qualification for membership.

Aircrews who make emergency ejections from ground level, or from decks of aircraft carriers are also eligible. Not eligible are paratroopers or

This really upset Dewey. So I came clean and told them what I had done and showed them it was perfectly harmless. I had also started to collect 20mm and 40mm projectiles which were easily found.

They needed personnel to set up tents at our new base at Venosa. Jones volunteered me. His explanation was to "keep me out of trouble." I did get rid of the 40mm, but did keep the 20mm projectiles. I was able to bring the grenade back with me and still have it today. "End of Comedy."

sport parachutists who fly with the intention of jumping. Nor are those whose lives may have been saved in situations where unopened parachute pack intercepts a bullet or shell fragment.

Applications should be sent to the Club Secretary, Irvin Great Britain Ltd., Ickneild Way, Hertfordshire, England. In North America applicants should write to the Caterpillar Club, Irvin Industries Canada Ltd., Port Erie, Ontario.

They must state the circumstances of the bail-out, place, date, type of chute. They must include a corroboratory statement from another person who can vouch for the facts — in case of military aircrew, their commanding officer. There is no entrance fee.

Goldfish Club: The Goldfish Club was formed in 1942 by Charles Robertson, then chief draftsman of the P.B. Cow and Co., manufacturers of Air-Sea rescue equipment.

The Goldfish Club is for those who have, in aircrew wartime slang have gone "down in the drink." Eligible are aircrews who have made an emergency bail-out into the sea. 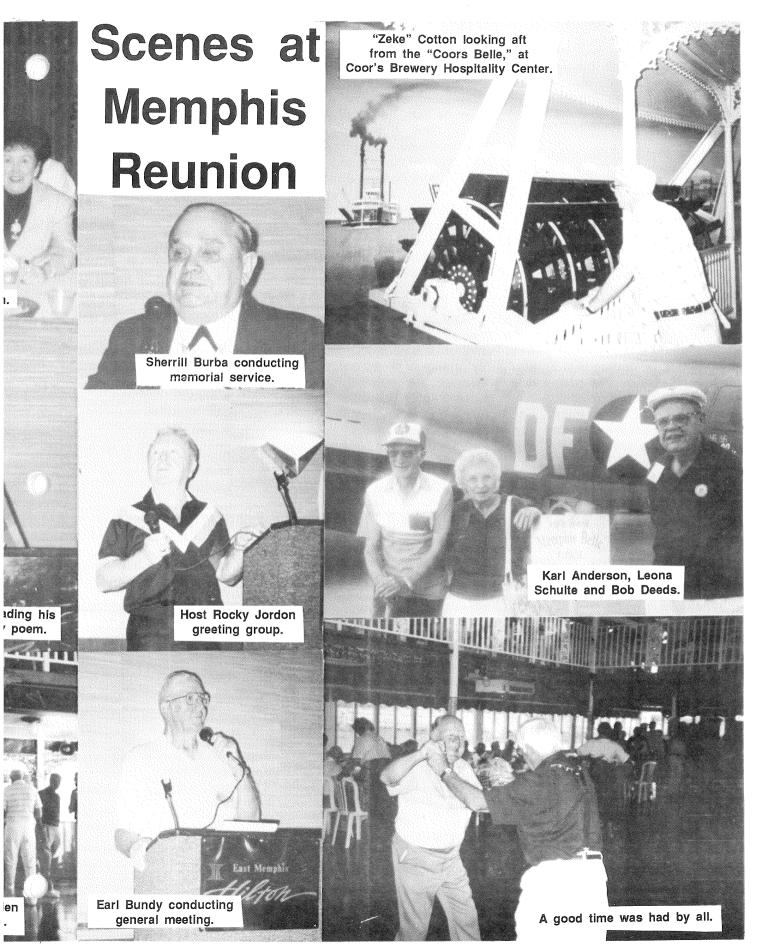

It was also mentioned that Kennedy's Southern Press would not ask for any "up front" monies and would assume all risks in publishing the 485th book. Any profits would go to his company.

Both Leonard Little and Bob Hanson also said that, by dealing with a publisher that had done this many times before, the time element would be a factor, and if the data was given to his company, we could expect the book to be a reality within a few months.

After some discussion, it was

agreed that the printed 485th Bomb Group forms would be distributed to blisher of Southern Heritage Press in those in attendance and would be filled out by the ones interested in purchasing the book, if published. Copies were distributed and approximately 135 completed forms were taken back to Southern Heritage Press by Hanson.

As this year's Lightweight Tower goes to press, there may be time to have photographs veterans may want to be included. All photos (with names, dates, etc. on the back) should be sent to our group historian, Sam Schneider. Articles might be included, as well.
